### GUIDELINES FOR AUTHORS

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#### **Journal format**

Full length research, case reports, reviews and short communication will be published in the journal.

#### **Short Communication**

A short communication is the result of a small investigation that has a significant contribution to knowledge. The format may or may not conform to that of full-length papers. A short communication also undergoes a process of peer review.

#### **Reviews**

Reviews will also be published in the journal provided the topic is of current interest and it is related to pathology.

#### **Full length research**

Full length manuscripts should be divided into title, abstract, key words, introduction, materials and methods, results, discussion, acknowledgments, references, figures and tables. The manuscript should be typed double-spaced. All submitted manuscripts must be accompanied with a letter indicating the willingness of the authors to publish their article in the African Journal of Cellular Pathology, that the article has not been published before and that it is not under consideration for publication in any other journal.

#### **Title page**

The title page should include the surname names, initials and affiliations of all authors. The address, telephone number and email address of the corresponding author should be provided separately.

#### **Abstract**

The abstract which should be structured into aim, methods, results and conclusion should not exceed 200 words and should be on a separate page. The abstract should be followed by 4 - 6 key words for indexing purposes.

#### **Introduction**

The purpose of the work should be clearly stated. References to published articles relating to the work should also be cited.

#### **Materials & Methods**

The experiment should be described but without unnecessary details, in a way that researchers can reproduce the work in the absence of the researchers. Where necessary, the age, sex, number of subjects, working environment, duration of administration of drug, dose and route of administration should be clearly stated. Names of subjects should not be mentioned. Setting, study design, sampling method and sample size should be mentioned where necessary.

#### **Results**

Results obtained from the methods should be clearly stated. Where tables, figures and plates have been used, these should be followed by brief explanatory notes. Where necessary, legends and keys should be provided.

## **Discussion**

The result of the study should be compared with the results of other researchers who have done similar works before a conclusion is made about the study.

## **Acknowledgments**

All those who have supported the work financially or materially should be acknowledged.

## **Tables**

Each table must have a short title and numbered sequentially in the order of their citation in the text. A short write up explaining the contents of the table must follow each table.

## **Figures and figure legends**

All figures must have a short title and numbered sequentially in the order of their citation in the text. A short write up explaining the figure must follow each figure. Figures should be submitted in JPG, EPS or TIF formats.

## **References**

Only publications that are cited in the text should be listed. References in the text should be in form of surname followed by initials and year of publication in the following format

1. (Alabi GO 2002) where it is at the end of the sentence
2. Alabi GO (2002) where it is at the beginning of a sentence
3. Oduola T and Kelvin GB (2013) where there are two authors
4. Odumosu et al., (2007) where the authors are more than two.

Personal communications and unpublished observations should be indicated only in the text and should not appear in the reference list. Authors should ensure accuracy of the references. References should be listed alphabetically and in the format below:
